## **2018 Preseason Power Rankings:**

Overall Rank. Team (Division Rank)

- 1. Rockies (Sandbar 1) The SWBL #1 preseason curse this year is on the Rockies. As arguably the most successful overall team in the franchise era, this team could be the first to break the curse and go back to back in 2018. The same squad of five will return and look to dominate the regular season atop the easiest division in the league. Brett's injuries are fully healed, BK is coming off a historic season in the field, Blake is due for a, bounce back to MVP form, and Grant and Breda are the best role players in the league. This team has depth in every aspect of the game and will once again, extend their streak and make a run in the playoffs.
- 2. Yankees (Cardinal Blinds 1) Last season, the pinstripes went 9-1, falling short to the Rockies in the playoffs, as they look to build into Season 16. We all know Kevin Pohle's graphics are fire, but he also had an incredible on field performance as well, that went under the radar in 2018. Scott was the MVP heading deep into Saturday and Jackson won his first CY Wiffle of his career. The Yankees have big bats in their lineup behind Scott, with Sam Bakula, and a newly signed John Calloway, as they look to get back to the championship. Scott will need another stellar season to backup Jackson on the mound, as the most on and off team in the franchise era history looks to build on last season's successes.
- 3. Royals (Glendale 1) You know you have a special season when you go 10-0 in the regular season, win your first playoff game in franchise history, and have two of your players finish in the top 2 of the MVP voting. Now, in 2018, the Royals have question marks surrounding their squad. Probably the most up and down team in a two-year stretch ever in the league's history, going from a 2<sup>nd</sup> place finish/Franchise of the Year Award in 2016 to our first ever, 9<sup>th</sup> place finisher in 2017. They have the tools to be successful. Luke, Steve, and Paul provide workhorses on the mound that can give you quality starts almost every time. All five players can hit, and they are a team with possibly the most heart. You saw their demeanor quickly change, loss after small margin loss in 2017, but the Athletics hope it was just a fluke as they head into Season 16. It doesn't help that they are in the most difficult division in the league, but when this team is at their best, they have proven they deserve to play with the big boys and could shock the world again and make a playoff push.
- 7. Diamondbax (Sandbar 2) Heading into their sophomore campaign as a franchise in the SWBL, the DBax look to improve on their 3-7, 6<sup>th</sup> place finish in 2017.
